### Arizona Housing Assistance and Homeless Prevention Funding Program Summary

### **Program Overview**

A number of state agencies and other entities in Arizona receive federal and/or state funding for housing assistance and homeless prevention programs (*see attachment*). In FY 2018, 6 state agencies received \$187 million in state and/or federal funding for housing assistance and homeless prevention programs. The Arizona Department of Housing's (DOH) primary function involves the administration of federal funds to create and preserve affordable housing. The remaining state agencies listed in the attachment provide direct housing assistance services as a supplemental component to their overall agency mission.

Non-state agencies also serve in a 'pass-through' capacity to facilitate the transfer of available funding from the funding provider to local entities who directly provide homeless prevention and housing assistance services. In FY 2018, the estimated level of funding was \$27 million. This analysis does not attempt to provide an exhaustive list of all local entities in the state which distribute funding for homeless prevention and housing assistance programs.

### Background

The Arizona Department of Housing administers programs for housing partners who apply to the department for funding. The majority of the department's programs are federally funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). DOH directly administers over \$100 million annually in federal and non-appropriated state housing and community development funds through a variety of housing and community improvement programs. DOH does not own or build housing but rather manages funding for the programs through for-profit and non-profit developers, faith-based organizations, service organizations, and state, county, and city entities who apply for funding and meet criteria developed by state and federal law. Typically, the department does not receive funding from the State General Fund. DOH houses the Arizona Home Foreclosure Prevention Funding Corporation and the Office of Manufactured Housing.

DOH also operates the Pathway to Purchase Program, which provides Arizona residents impacted by foreclosures in designated areas with 30-year fixed-rate mortgages along with a second down payment assistance mortgage. The down payment assistance mortgage is provided by the Arizona Industrial Development Authority (AzIDA), which partners with DOH. The AzIDA is a non-profit corporation and political subdivision of the State of Arizona housed within the Arizona Commerce Authority. In addition to partnering with DOH to administer the Pathway to Purchase Program, AzIDA also operates 2 programs which provided financing assistance totaling \$107 million to both home buyers and developers of multi-family housing in 2018.

### FY 2020 One-Time State Funding

The FY 2020 General Appropriation Act included a one-time \$15.0 million appropriation from the State General Fund to DOH to deposit into the department's Housing Trust Fund (HTF). An accompanying footnote requires \$3.5 million of that amount to be spent on constructing or renovating facilities and on housing assistance, including support services, for persons who have been determined to be seriously mentally ill and to be chronically resistant to treatment. The remaining \$11.5 million may be used in accordance with the general purposes of the HTF as defined by A.R.S. § 41-3955 to develop projects and programs connected with providing housing opportunities for low- and moderate-income households and for housing affordability.
